

SYNOPSIS

A companion piece to La Boite's critically acclaimed 2017 offering *The Village, The Neighbourhood* is an intimate storytelling experience that transports audiences across countries, borders, and oceans in search of home; all from within the walls of the Roundhouse Theatre.

This revelatory work tracks seven individual, real-life journeys from the experience of fleeing homelands, to seeking refuge and creating, fostering and discovering a new community (or neighbourhood) in Australia.

The Neighbourhood promises an evening of honest, authentic, and deeply moving theatre, imbued with a sense of hope, power and recognition.

Written and co-created by the storytellers themselves, *The Neighbourhood* traverses a range of storytelling forms to examine the concept of home and the vital importance of belonging. This work is co-created with Todd MacDonald, Aleea Monsour and Ari Palani with an ensemble of seven local storytellers.

Why should high school students see this show?

This show provides an important and intimate experience for high school students to engage with refugee, asylum seeker and migrant stories. With a modern day Australian society which is made up of people from all different places and backgrounds, this show starts an imperative conversation with the young people of our communities. It gives space to stories which have seldom been given voice and asks an important question for our future about how we welcome people and how we form our neighbourhood.

What kind of stories are audiences going to hear?

This play will tell the often silenced stories of refugee, asylum seeker and migrant communities throughout the personal experiences and memories of seven storytellers. This will be an intimate storytelling experience, about the delicate and deeply connected process of making community in a new place.

What should audiences expect to see and experience?

The Neighbourhood will be an exciting and moving piece which brings together music, poetry and performance to share these inspiring and important stories. We ask audiences to travel with us on this journey and to walk in the shoes of these seven storytellers.

MIGRANTS, REFUGEES & ASYLUM SEEKERS

What is the difference between a migrant, refugee and an asylum seeker?

TERMINOLOGY	DEFINITION	CHARACTERISTICS/ EXPLANATION
Migrants	A Migrant is someone who chooses to leave their country of origin for personal or economic reasons.	Have chosen and planned their migration. Migrants usually have all their documentation organised, arrive with most of their belongings and usually have funds to sustain them for a few years. Migrants are generally able to say goodbye to family and friends and can return home.
Refugees	A refugee is someone who has been forced to flee their country because of persecution, war or violence. They have sought asylum and after processing have been assessed as having a genuine need for protection.	Protecting refugees is UNHCR's core mandate. Refugees have to move if they are to save their lives or preserve their freedom. They have no protection from their own state - in fact, it is often their own government that is threatening to persecute them.
Asylum Seekers	An asylum seeker is someone seeking protection but whose claim for refugee status has not yet been assessed.	There is confusion as to the difference. Asylum seekers and refugees often have parallel journeys and experiences but their status here in Australia hasn't been assessed or confirmed yet.

THINGS TO PONDER

EXPERIENCES OF REFUGEES & ASYLUM SEEKERS

The experiences of refugees and asylum seekers bare many similarities, however every journey is unique to the individual regarding the country from which they've come, the journey they have taken and the number of places they have stayed along the way, as well as their final steps to protection in Australia.

Many people fleeing violence never get out of their countries and remain Internally Displaced Persons within their country. This means that they cannot return home and have sought refuge in another part of their country.

Experiences of Refugees & Asylum Seekers:

- Forced to leave home
- Usually fleeing from their country of origin by way of other countries
- Arrive with very little documentation
- · Loss of home and possessions
- · Loss of family and friends
- Limited sources of social support
- Loss of physical and emotional safety
- Arrive with very little or no funds
- Disrupted schooling
- Poor health
- Cannot return home
- Political harassment
- May have experienced or witnessed torture and rape
- They often leave behind:
 - Important papers
 - Special possessions
 - Household goods
 - Clothing
 - Family and friends
