### LA BOITE'S HWY FESTIVAL RETURNS FOR A FIFTH YEAR WITH DIVERSITY AT FOREFRONT OF LINE-UP

La Boite's annual HWY Festival is returning for its fifth consecutive year, with a brand new line-up of performances, workshops and masterclasses aplenty for local artists, producers, and practitioners across Queensland, from March 4-18.

In partnership with Screen Queensland, Brisbane Airport Corporation and QPAC, this year's festival invites audiences to discover the tremendous breath of artistic talent in Brisbane highlighting the city's dynamic theatre sector.

In celebration of HWY's fifth year, La Boite has launched a bursary program to support Australian artists of diverse backgrounds, genders and abilities, by covering the cost of one full and half-day workshop for 12 successful applicants.

Those who identify as Culturally and/or Linguistically Diverse (CALD), Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander (ATSI), Deaf and disabled or Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual, Transgender, Intersex (LGBTIQ+) have been given the opportunity to apply.

La Boite Creative Producer, Sanja Simic, said this was established with tLa Boite's core values in mind; to support emerging to mid-career artists in the sector.


"Supporting emerging and mid-career artists is fundamental in our role at La Boite, and inclusivity is at the heart of what we do. With this new bursary program, we're able to directly support artists that identify as diverse through their backgrounds, identities or abilities," said Ms Simic.

"In essence, HWY provides a platform for theatre-lovers and practitioners of all stripes, from all walks of life, to engage with professional development opportunities and road-test new work and ideas in real time."

Along with a strong line-up of workshops curated and delivered by a host of industry powerhouses, HWY's performance program will showcase seven new works in development, an evening of stage-to-screen pitches by local playwrights and theatre-makers, a party to mark International Women's Day, and a bevy of other events.

For the first time, La Boite is partnering with Playlab Theatre's Playwright Development Program SPARKS in partnership with Queensland Performing Arts Centre (QPAC), to co-present HWY x SPARKS: Shadow in a Dress as part of the HWY performance program line-up.

"We're immensely excited to collaborate with QPAC and Playlab Theatre, to present a reading of Hannah Belanszky's latest work, which has had an early stage development through the SPARKS program at QPAC's Clancestry," continued Ms Simic.

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
