First play well done BRISBANE Repertory D Theatre began its 1952 season last night with the steasing of Ronald Jeans'

The piece, produced in orderly fashion by Gloria Birdwood - Smith, demonstrated the knack British playwrights have for writing laughable theatre material.

In its easy going way it worked up to some very compromising situations on the misfit husbands-andwives theme. Dialogue was sexy to a degree.
